**Benjamin Kamine** a PhD candidate in Midrash at the Jewish Theological Seminary, works as an adjunct instructor in Rabbinic Literatures and Cultures. His doctoral research explores how early Rabbinic heretic material reveals the contours of third-century Rabbinic identity both in what the rabbis prohibit and in how they express those prohibitions. As interreligious dialoguer and facilitator, he also serves as the Associate Director of JTS' Milstein Center for Interreligious Dialogue and adjunct faculty in Interreligious Engagement at Union Theological Seminary. Benjamin's recent publications include: "From Midrash to Dialogue: Teaching Judaism in Interreligious Spaces."
